A. Multiple choice

1. **C) much** — Sugar is uncountable, so the question word is how much.
2. **C) many** — Eggs can be counted one by one, so the question word is how many.
3. **D) advice** — Advice is uncountable in English: no plural and no article.
4. **A) some information** — Information is uncountable, so it takes some rather than a or a plural -s.
5. **D) furniture** — Furniture is uncountable and takes a singular verb, whatever the number of items.
6. **B) two loaves of bread** — Bread is uncountable, so it needs a unit word — a loaf, a slice, a piece — to be counted.
7. **C) was** — Traffic is uncountable and therefore singular, so the verb is was.
8. **A) a glass** — A container word turns an uncountable noun into something you can order by the unit.
9. **A) much** — Luggage is uncountable in English, so it takes how much.
10. **D) news is** — News ends in -s but is uncountable and singular, so it takes is.
