A. Multiple choice

1. **D) Although** — Although is a conjunction and can be followed by a full clause with a subject and verb.
2. **D) Despite** — Despite is a preposition and takes a noun phrase, not a clause.
3. **A) Therefore** — Therefore is an adverb linking two separate sentences to show a result.
4. **C) It was late. However, we carried on.** — However is an adverb, so it needs a full stop or semicolon before it and a comma after.
5. **A) because of** — Because of takes a noun; plain because would need a clause after it.
6. **B) even though** — Even though is a conjunction and introduces the clause he was exhausted.
7. **C) After** — After can act as a preposition and be followed by an -ing form; the others cannot.
8. **C) whereas** — Whereas is a conjunction used specifically to draw a direct contrast between two facts.
9. **C) so** — So introduces a result and joins the two clauses with a comma before it.
10. **B) Although** — Only a conjunction can introduce a clause with a subject and a finite verb.

B. Fill in the blank

1. **Although** — A conjunction is needed because a full clause follows.
2. **Despite** — A preposition is needed because a noun phrase follows.
3. **Therefore** — An adverb of result links two separate sentences.
4. **because** — Because of introduces the noun phrase naming the reason.
