A. Multiple choice

1. **A) Could** — Could is the standard polite request form, and has nothing to do with past time here.
2. **C) could** — Could describes a general ability that lasted over a period in the past.
3. **B) was able to** — For a single successful occasion in the past, English needs was or were able to rather than could.
4. **B) should** — Should gives advice about the sensible course of action.
5. **A) May** — May is the careful, formal way of asking permission from someone senior.
6. **D) She cans swim.** — Modal verbs never take a third-person s.
7. **C) had better** — Had better gives strong advice with an implied warning about the consequences.
8. **A) might** — Might expresses a genuine possibility that is neither certain nor unlikely.
9. **D) Should is advice, must is obligation** — Should recommends; must imposes. Confusing the two makes ordinary advice sound like an order.
10. **A) couldn't** — Couldn't is the negative of past ability.
