1. **A) into** — Into describes the movement from outside to inside; in would describe the position.
2. **B) across** — Across describes movement from one side of a flat surface to the other.
3. **A) through** — Through is used when the path passes inside something enclosed.
4. **B) He entered the room.** — Enter takes a direct object with no preposition at all.
5. **A) over** — Over describes passing above something without touching it.
6. **D) past** — Past is the preposition; passed is the past tense of the verb to pass.
7. **B) over** — Over describes movement from one side to the other by going above.
8. **C) Towards shows direction without necessarily arriving** — To implies arrival; towards describes the direction of travel only.
9. **B) onto** — Onto marks the movement to a surface; on would describe the resulting position.
10. **D) in** — Arrive in is used for cities and countries; arrive at is for buildings and points.
