Every answer carries the reason behind it. Read the reason for the questions you got right as well — that is where you find out whether you were right for the right reason.

A. Multiple choice

1. **C) had shredded** — The past perfect marks an action completed before the later past event in the same sentence.
2. **A) had been staring** — Past evidence of an activity that ran up to that past moment takes the past perfect continuous.
3. **A) used to live / would walk** — Used to covers past states; would covers only repeated actions, so live cannot take would.
4. **A) was going** — Was going to reports an intention that was formed in advance and then abandoned.
5. **B) was about** — Was about to describes being on the very point of acting when something interrupts.
6. **C) When I arrived, the meeting had already started.** — The earlier of two past events takes the past perfect; the later one stays in the past simple.
7. **B) was playing** — The past continuous supplies the background action that a sudden past simple event interrupts.
8. **D) He would own a small vineyard.** — Would cannot express a past state; ownership is a state, so only used to works there.
9. **D) had been** — The illness preceded the realisation, so the earlier state takes the past perfect.
10. **B) had been working** — Duration running up to a stated past point takes the past perfect continuous.

B. Fill in the blank

1. **had** — The past perfect is had plus the past participle and marks the earlier of two past events.
2. **used** — Used to introduces a finished past occupation, which is a state rather than an action.
3. **would** — Would expresses a repeated past action, which is exactly what a weekly outing is.
4. **had** — The perfect continuous in the past uses had plus been plus the -ing form.
5. **was** — Was about to describes an action interrupted at the very last moment.
6. **were** — A plural subject takes were with going to for an intention that was dropped.
